

EARLY LITERACY TIPS

- Let your child doodle in soft substances, such as sandboxes at the park or yogurt at mealtime! This simple activity will help strengthen eye-hand coordination that will help them with writing later on.
- Read out loud whatever you come across during your day to your child (street signs, grocery store labels or even posters at the doctor's clinic) to improve your child's vocabulary when they start talking.

(circle face with finger)

Two eyes, a nose (point to the eyes and nose)
And a mouth (point to baby's mouth)
Just like me! (give your baby a kiss)

ACTIVITIES



- Play with empty boxes together with your baby when they are able to sit up. Empty boxes encourage creativity and thinking skills. Mobile infants can crawl through large boxes or stack smaller ones.
- Make funny faces. This helps children learn to read facial expressions. Place baby on your lap in front of a mirror and make silly faces. If you have a child-safe mirror, place it on the floor and allow mobile babies to crawl across it. Learning to distinguish differences is a literacy activity!




