



Head to your favourite library and let your child choose fairy tales that interest them.

Reading with children develops their language and literacy skills.

Read aloud and encourage your child to read along with you. You can initiate conversations about stories by asking, "What do you see on this page?" or "What do you think will happen next?"



Storytelling with Your Child



You can make your storytelling more fun with props! Based on those stories, use some recycled paper and have your child draw and colour the characters.

An iconic example would be Cinderella, Prince Charming,

2 Evil Stepsisters, an Evil Stepmother, a castle and a glass slipper.



Fairy Tale Vocabulary



Reading gives your child new vocabulary they may not hear everyday. While you are reading together and your child comes across a difficult word, explain the meaning and excite them to learn something new. The more you read, the more words you will know!


