

PART V: A MALAYAN LANGUAGE

(THE SHORT STORIES AND RADIO PLAYS OF S. RAJARATNAM)

VOICE 1: And now, dear brothers and sisters, I shall call upon that champion of the people – Malaya's well-known politician – a man who can truly be described as 'your friend, my friend –everybody's friend' – Mr Silver Tongue.

SILVER TONGUE: Brothers and sisters, Merdeka! (CROWD: MERDEKA! MERDEKA!) I do not propose to make a long speech tonight. I shall say what I have to say simply, briefly and bluntly. My theme tonight is unity. Unless we, the various races who live in Malaya become one nation, one people – unless we become loyal Malayans, there can never be peace and progress in this lovely land of ours. What does it matter that we are Malays, Chinese, Indians or Eurasians – or Eskimos or Patagonians. What does it matter if our skins are this or that shade. Remember that beneath the skin we are brothers.

NARRATOR: Wasted? Why, there must be at least three thousand people listening to him. What he has said should make them think.

VOICE 2: That's where you are wrong. I agree he said some fine things. But not many of the three thousand understood him.

NARRATOR: Come off it. Don't be so superior. Just because they are ordinary people you think they are all stupid.

VOICE 2: Now just a minute, I didn't say they were all stupid. All I said was that they didn't understand a word of what he was saying.

NARRATOR: But he spoke in fairly simple English. A little bit pompous and flashy perhaps...

VOICE 2: Well only some 10 percent of the people of Malaya are said to be literate in English. Let us, however, put it at double that figure – 20 percent. So only 20 percent of your typical Malayan crowd understood what Mr. Silver Tongue was saying. For the remaining 80 percent Mr. Silver Tongue's earth-shaking speech was a series of beautiful but meaningless sounds. If he should call them idiots or tell them to take a running jump they would still give him a big hand at the end of his speech.
