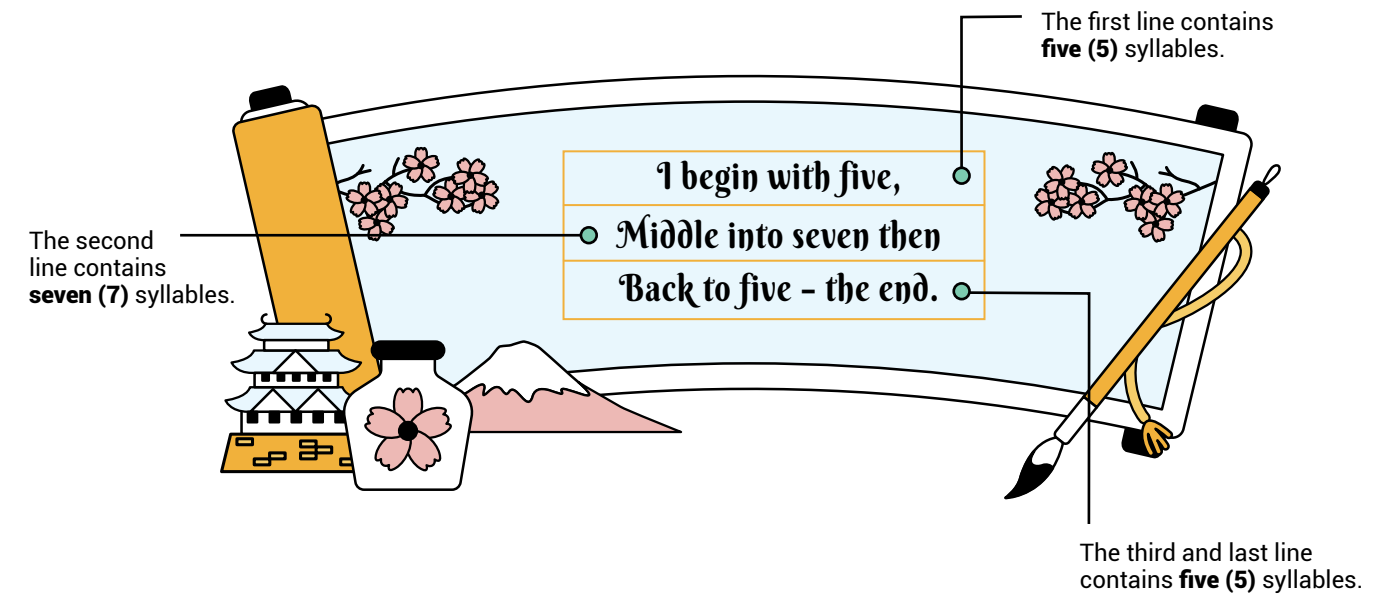


HAI THERE, HAIKU



The haiku is a short poem usually composed of three lines.

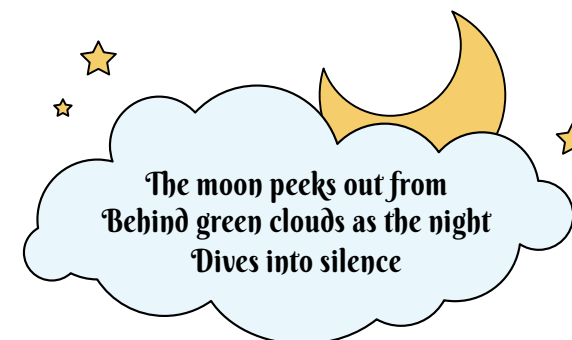


5-7-5! That should be easy enough to remember.

The haiku is a type of poem that originated from Japan. Matsuo Bashō, the Japanese poet, popularised the haiku form during the Edo period (1603-1867) as he travelled through the country and wrote verses on the natural scenery he encountered.

Given the haiku's compact structure, the writer of a haiku must not use more words than needed. Ideally, a haiku should be read in one breath.

Below is an example of a haiku on the night sky:
